I Mid-branching sentences

I feel—and the anxiety is still vivid to me—that I might easily have failed before I began.

I, sensing a possible rival, wondering who he was, watched him warily.

The effect?

I. Left-branching sentences

Sensing a possible rival, wondering who he was, I watched him warily.

II. Right-branching sentences

I watched him warily, sensing a possible, wondering who he was.

# **Inverted appositives**

Which one is better? Why?

A lonely boy, Coleridge retreated into books.

A lonely boy, Coleridge was born in 1772.

### **Parallelism**

But it is, on the contrary, wonderfully dramatic and picturesque.

(Deliberate faulty parallelism) Here was himself, young good-looking, snappy dresser and making dough.

### Sentence length

Only a portion of the painting is shown here, called a "detail." The actual painting is wider and includes more buildings and people.

 $\rightarrow$  This book will not tell you how to die. Some cheer-leaders of war can always get out a pamphlet telling the best way to go through that small but unnecessary business at the end.

Why is the latter better?
